The Money Statistics – August 2015 summary



Every day in the UK

The population of the UK grew by an estimated **1,223** people a day between 2003 and 2013.

It costs an average of **£29.91** per day to raise a child from birth to the age of 21.

On average, a UK household spends **£3.10** a day on water, electricity and gas.

206 people a day are declared insolvent or bankrupt. This is equivalent to one person **every 6 minutes 53 seconds**.

36 million plastic card purchase transactions were made every day in May 2015, with a total value of **£1.7 billion**.

8.9m cash machine transactions were made every day in June with a value of **£355m**.

2,330 Consumer County Court Judgements (CCJs) are issued every day, with an average value of **£2,171**.

Citizens Advice Bureaux in England and Wales dealt with **6,323** new debt problems every *working day* during the year ending March 2015.

48 properties are repossessed every day, or one every **29 min 42 seconds**.

The number of mortgages with arrears of over 2.5% of the remaining balance fell by **67** a day.

The number of people unemployed for over 12 months fell by **504** per day.

1,311 people a day reported they had become redundant between March and May.

Government borrowed **£313m** a day during June 2015 (**£3,636** per second).

Net lending to individuals in the UK increased by **£109m** a day.

Borrowers would repay **£147m** a day in interest over a year, based on June 2015 trends.

63 mortgage possession claims and **47** mortgage possession orders are made every day.

469 landlord possession claims and **349** landlord possession orders are made every day.



Personal debt in the UK

People in the UK owed **£1.441 trillion** at the end of June 2015.

- This is up from £1.409 trillion at the end of June 2014 – an extra **£628** per UK adult.

The average total debt per household – including mortgages – was **£53,961** in June. The revised figure for May was £53,838.

Per adult in the UK that's an average debt of **£28,532** in June – around **111.2%** of average earnings. This is up from a revised £28,467 in May.

Based on June 2015 trends, the UK's total interest repayments on personal debt over a 12 month period would have been **£53.497 billion**.

- That's an average of **£147 million** per day.
- This means that households in the UK would have paid an average of **£2,003** in annual interest repayments. Per person that's **£1,059** – **4.13%** of average earnings.

Outstanding consumer credit lending was **£172.34 billion** at the end of June 2015.

- This is up from £161.1 billion at the end of June 2014, and is an increase of **£222.17** for every adult in the UK.

Per household, that's an average consumer credit debt of **£6,454** in June, up from a revised £6,427 in May - or **£420** extra per household over the year.

It also means the average consumer credit borrowing stood at **£3,413** per UK adult in June. This is up from a revised £3,398 in May.

Total credit card debt in June 2015 was **£61.8bn**. Per household this is **£2,314** – for a credit card bearing the average interest, it would take **25 years and 4 months** to repay if you made only the minimum repayment each month.

- The minimum repayment in the first month would be **£55** but reduces each month. If you paid **£55 every month**, the debt would be cleared in around **5 years and 4 months**.

UK Banks and Building Societies **wrote off £3.163 billion** of loans to individuals over the four quarters to Q1 2015.

Mortgages, rent, and housing



Outstanding mortgage lending stood at **£1.269 trillion** at the end of June.

- This is up from £1.248 trillion at the end of June 2014.

That means that the estimated average outstanding mortgage for the 11.1m households with mortgage debt was **£114,535** in May.

The average Mortgage Interest rate was 3.09% at the end of June. Based on this, households with mortgages would pay an average of **£3,539** in mortgage interest over the year.

For new loans, the average Mortgage Interest rate was 2.56%. Using the latest figures from the Council of Mortgage Lenders, this means new mortgages would attract an average of **£3,214** in interest over the year.

According to the Council of Mortgage Lenders, gross mortgage lending in June totalled an estimated £20.5 billion.

- This is 15% higher than June 2014, and 29% up on May 2015.

The average monthly rent for a two-bedroom house in England was £595 – in London this was £1,400 (**135% higher**).



Savings and pensions

In Q1 2015, households saved an average of **4.9%** of their post-tax income, including benefits, the lowest figure since Q3 2008.


The average interest rate for an instant access savings account – not including bonus interest payments – was 0.38% in April. For a cash ISA, this was 0.86%.

It would take **19 years** for someone on the average salary, saving the average amount per household every year in an average instant access savings account, to afford the average first-time buyer deposit. If they saved into a cash ISA at the same rate it would take **18 years**.

The Pensions Regulator estimates that at least **5.286 million** employees had joined a pension scheme under auto-enrolment by the end of June 2015.

According to the Family Resources Survey, **30%** of adults actively participated in a pension in 2013/14, up **4%** on the previous year. This was **52%** for employees, and **17%** for the self-employed.

Spending and loans



In Q1 2015, households in the UK spent **£82.80m** a day on water, electricity and gas – or **£3.10** per household per day.

The average interest rate on credit card lending bearing interest was **18.14%** in June. This is **17.64%** above the Bank of England Base Rate (0.5%).

British Bankers Association figures show that 58.4% of credit card balances were bearing interest in June 2015.
