

The Money Charity is the UK's financial capability charity.

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Comments:

We are alarmed that the draft GCSE subject content appears to include extremely little (and on some interpretations includes none) of the financial education provision in the programme of study.

The only possible mention is under 'The Economy, Finance and Money', in the bullet that reads: "the practice of budgeting and managing risk and how it is used by government to manage complex decisions about the allocation of public funding."

It is not clear whether "the practice of budgeting and managing risk" solely relates to government decisions, or whether management of individual personal finance is included within this. If this is intended to refer to personal budgeting and risk management this needs to be made far clearer – and even if this is the intention, it should explicitly refer to the concepts outlined in the programme of study: income and expenditure, credit and debt, insurance, savings and pensions, and financial products and services.

The financial education content of the KS4 programme of study appears to be the only element of the programme of study that does not have a clear reflection in the draft GCSE subject content. It is counter-intuitive that those students who do choose to take a citizenship GCSE would not be assessed on this discrete element of the programme of study.

Financial education has a key role to play in helping young people develop into active and responsible citizens. Without assessment it is likely that schools entering pupils for the citizenship studies GCSE will focus on the areas that are being assessed and pay less attention to the financial education elements of the curriculum. We, along with fellow members of the Youth Financial Capability Group, urge the Department to maintain its previous recognition of the importance of financial education as part of preparation for later life by explicitly including it in the citizenship GCSE content.

Comments:

One of the aims of the citizenship programme of study is to "equip pupils with the skills and knowledge to ... manage their money well and make sound financial decisions" – at present, even the ambiguous content we highlight in response to question 1a) would not be included in the short course, meaning that the short course would not assess this aim of the curriculum.

As we state above, financial education should form part of the GCSE in citizenship studies – it should also be part of the short course.
